# HEBREWS CHAPTER 3:

**3:1-6 MAIN POINT:** Jesus is superior to Moses as the builder and son over God's house.

**1. In what two ways does the writer tell us that Christ is better than Moses?**

- Jesus is faithful as a Son over God's house, whereas Moses was faithful as a servant in God's house (v.5-6)
- The builder of the house (Christ) has more honor than the house itself (Moses) (v.3-4)

# HEBREWS CHAPTER 3:

## 2. Who held the positions of “Apostle” and “High Priest” in the Old Testament?

- Moses held the positions of Apostle and High Priest in the Old Testament as God's chosen servant and mediator.

## 3. How do we belong to the household of Christ?

- We belong to the household of Christ if we hold fast to our confidence and hope in Christ (v.6).
- Through faith in Christ, we are adopted into God's family.

# HEBREWS CHAPTER 3:

**What do you learn about God from this chapter? How does this change the way you see God and how does this change your life? How does this encourage us to stand in the faith?**

- God shows amazing grace by making us His children through Christ. As God's beloved children, we have confidence to endure trials, knowing we have an eternal inheritance.
- Our life is hidden in Christ, giving us hope to boast in. Since God adopted us, we need not fear others.
- This truth gives us joy and changes how we see ourselves.

# THE DECEITFULNESS OF SIN

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HEBREWS 3:7-19

## Deceitfulness of Sin:

- We are not to harden our hearts as Israel did in the wilderness (v. 7-11)
- Beware of having an evil, unbelieving heart turning away from God (v.12)
- Encourage one another daily—avoid sins hardening deceitfulness (v.13)
- We share in Christ, if we hold firmly to our original conviction (v. 14)
- Do not repeat the rebellion of Israel, who failed to enter God's rest because of their unbelief (v. 15-19)

## Implications:

- We are in danger of missing out on God's rest if we neglect his voice.
- We are in need of constant vigilance and mutual support to resist sin.
- We are in possession of a great salvation that requires our perseverance.
